Taiwan to End COVID-19 Tests on Philippine Arrivals with No Symptoms

Thursday, September 24, 2020

The Central Epidemic Command Center (CECC) has decided to suspend the COVID-19 testing of all travelers arriving from the Philippines, except for those with symptoms, beginning Thursday, but said it will require all travelers from the Philippines be tested before their mandatory 14-day quarantine period ends.

The changes were agreed after considering epidemic hazard, the characteristic of the novel coronavirus disease, and testing efficiency, Health Minister and CECC commander Chen Shih-chung said at a press briefing on Wednesday.

On July 26, Taiwan began requiring all travelers from the Philippines -- with or without COVID-19 symptoms -- to be tested for COVID-19 upon arrival.

As of Sept. 20, a total of 1,238 travelers from the Southeast Asian country had been tested, the center said in a press release.

on? Philippines, Singapore and Malaysia Ponder the Unthinkable

September 24, 2020

Malaysia appeared poised for a new round of political turmoil after opposition leader Anwar Ibrahim claimed to have enough support from lawmakers to form a government.

Prime Minister Muhyiddin Yassin denounced the move on Wednesday (Sept 23) and challenged Datuk Seri Anwar to prove his assertion, while saying his administration remains firmly in control.

Key members of his coalition signed a joint statement to reaffirm support for the Premier, although the leader of the United Malays National Organisation the largest in the ruling bloc - said "a few" members are supporting Mr Anwar.

September 22, 2020

As part of Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi's 'self-reliant India' policy, Defence Minister Rajnath Singh issued a list of 101 defence items in August with different timelines beyond which their import will be banned, with a second list soon to follow. From December 2020, the armed forces will not be able to purchase some 69 types of foreign-sourced military goods, including many major weapons systems and platforms: ship-borne cruise missiles, diesel submarines, missile destroyers, light combat aircraft and helicopters.

Most of these are already produced in India under licence, so the government is confident the ban will force the Indian defence industry to achieve selfsufficiency within a decade.

September 19, 2020

Across Southeast Asia, scenario planning exercises by analysts and policymakers preparing for the unthinkable – a military clash between the world's two largest economies in their backyard – has taken on added significance in recent weeks.

Tensions between the US and China, already fraught over trade, technology and the South China Sea, deepened as Beijing protested against Washington's ties to Taipei and conducted military activities close to the self-ruled island last week.

The question "What will happen if a shooting war erupts between China and the US?" has played on the mind of Manilabased defence researcher Jose Antonio Custodio.
