Similarly, professors from Thammasat University talked on local approaches of disaster preparedness in Thailand.

Beijing's Animosity Toward Taiwan's DPP Is Bad for Everyone

Relations between Beijing and Taipei have been steadily deteriorating over the past three years, with one of the key reasons being a historical Chinese policy not to engage with any Democratic Progressive Party (DPP)-led administrations from Taiwan. It is understandable that in Beijing's perception, being open to dialogue with the DPP could risk being perceived as lending legitimacy toward the DPP's views on Taiwan's statehood. In the DPP's party charter, it does state in the first clause its aim to "establish a sovereign, independent, and autonomous Republic of Taiwan."

the past two decades. What Beijing's nonconciliatory attitude toward the DPP has done, in effect, was to discredit factions within the DPP that advocated engaging China and push the entire party (and its supporters) further away. Instead of advancing its principle of peaceful unification, what the Chinese government is doing now is enabling a self-fulfilling prophecy that only force can ultimately resolve bilateral differences. The use of force would be equally disastrous for Taiwan and China, and would almost certainly destroy China's international image and significantly destabilize its domestic order.

However, this stalemate has increasingly frustrated not only the DPP, but also Beijing in

Taiwan is a model that shows democracy is a universal idea and not just a western idea as China tends to argue, Gershman said. "China will say, 'well China's different because it is a Confucian civilization and you can't have democracy in a hierarchical Confucian country.' Well, Taiwan shows that you can," he said.

The annual ceremony was hosted by the Taiwan Foundation for Democracy, which is dedicated to strengthening democracy and human rights in Taiwan and abroad.

Taiwan, Vietnam Ink New Version of Bilateral Investment Pact

Taiwan and Vietnam have signed a new version of a bilateral investment agreement (BIA) to provide better protection for Taiwanese investors in the Southeast Asian nation,

the Ministry of Economic Affairs said.

The new pact has an investor-to-state dispute settlement mechanism to facilitate negotiations between Taiwanese investors and the Vietnamese government.

If the disputes cannot be resolved in six months, they would be able to resort to international arbitration.

When Taiwanese investors encounter investment obstacles, the Taiwanese government would also be able to negotiate with its Vietnamese counterpart for assistance in removing the hurdles, the ministry said.

Foreign Investment in Taiwan up nearly 20% in the First 11 Months

Foreign investment in Taiwan during the first 11 months of the year was up nearly 20 percent year on year, driven mainly by investment from European wind power developers, the Investment Commission (IC) reported Friday.

During the January-November period, foreign investment in the domestic market totaled US\$10.29 billion, a 19.97 percent increase on an annual basis, the IC said, attributing the rise to investment by Germany's wpd AG and Demark's Ørsted Wind Power TW Holding A/S, both offshore wind energy developers.

In contrast, Taiwan's outbound investment plunged 51.47 percent to US\$6.219 billion from the same period of 2018, which the IC ascribed to a high comparison base and the impact of trade frictions between the United States and China.

Nevertheless, investment by Taiwanese companies in some countries included in the New Southbound Policy such as Vietnam, Singapore, Australia and Thailand grew to US\$2.613 billion, increasing 18.99 percent year on year, the IC said.


