Call for Submission: TAEF Survey on Taiwan NGOs' Responses to Covid-19 in Asia



Due on April 20 , 2021

Do you work for a Taiwanese NGO in South and Southeast Asia? And how was your organization's work affected in 2020 in the midst of a global health crisis?

In the year 2020, the Covid-19 pandemic swept the world. The resulting lockdown measures have pushed the already disadvantaged groups into a more vulnerable situation. Taiwan has done a relatively good job in fighting the pandemic. Not only did


the Taiwanese government send masks and medical supplies to countries in need, but also the Taiwanese international development NGOs offered help and provided services for the disadvantaged groups in other countries.

In view of this, TAEF, with a focus on South and Southeast Asia, intends to conduct a questionnaire survey to understand how Taiwanese NGOs' overseas work has been affected by the Covid-19, and what kinds of measures they have adopted to mitigate the negative effects posed by the pandemic on their work and to ensure their services can be well delivered to their clients.

This survey also attempts to understand the outcomes of the adopted measures, the difficulties the NGOs faced, and the future direction of their work in response to the continued spread of Covid-19 in 2021.

Please help fill in this online questionnaire if your organization in Taiwan delivers international development works in South and Southeast Asia, due on April 20, 2021. Your participation will be highly appreciated.

The collected data will be analyzed and used to write an article picturing Taiwanese NGOs' Responses to Covid-19 in Asia. The article, together with a number of cases, will be published in Chinese and English versions later this year, presenting Taiwanese NGOs' capacity.

TAEF's Visiting Fellow Sana Hashmi Spoke at the Legislative Yuan

On March 26, TAEF visiting fellow Dr. Sana Hashmi was invited to speak at the conference, "Taiwan's strategy under Inia-China competition," held at the Legislative Yuan on March 26.

Dr. Hashmi mentioned that during the last year the Covid-19 pandemic has attracted India's attention to Taiwan's strategic position and that Taiwan-India relations should not be limited to jointly deterring the threat of China. New Delhi should detach its Taiwan policy from China.

She then suggested some potential partnerships and cooperations between Taiwan and India: Indian think tanks or media, for instance, can open their branch offices in Taiwan; or the Taiwanese government can provide New Southbound scholarships, funding research projects on India's Look East Policy--a way in which Taiwan can involve in the discussions over the Policy. Last but not least, Dr. Hashmi pointed out some limits existing between Taiwan and India, such as India's compliance to One China Policy.

Taiwan and the Possibility of the Quad Plus

"Including Taiwan in the Quad Plus might not be a step in the right direction. There are many other ways to facilitate Taiwan's participation in the Indo-Pacific."

On March 12, in the first-ever Quadrilateral Security Leaders' summit that took place virtually, the four member countries — Australia, India, Japan, and the United States — reiterated their commitment to promote a free, open rules-based order in the Indo-Pacific. Following the order, they will advance security and prosperity and counter threats both in the region and beyond. The landmark summit resulted in a single joint statement showing the greater alignment of interests and approaches among the four countries.

China's growing aggression compelled the Quad countries to revive the grouping in 2017, after a decade of lying dormant. Taiwan, a fellow democracy under its direct threat, seems to be a plausible member. However, even though the U.S. and Japan support the expansion of Taiwan's global space, certain of the contribution that Taiwan could make towards ensuring a rules-based order, Taiwan is not only absent from the high-level discussions but also not at the top of the Quad's agenda yet.

Discussing Taiwan under the Quad framework might demonstrate the four countries' commitment to maintaining the rules-based order in the region, but including it in the Quad Plus might not be a step in the right direction. Taiwan should figure prominently in the discussions within the Quad at all levels and the focus should be on finding a way to facilitate Taiwan's participation in the Indo-Pacific.

'Indian Holi Taipei' event to donate funds to Hualien train crash victims

The proceeds from the annual "Indian Holi Taipei" festival, which will be held at a riverside park in New Taipei on Saturday (April 10), will be donated to a relief fund for victims of the Hualien train derailment.

Tickets are NT\$450 and will include an Indian vegetarian lunch, bottled water, snacks, beverage, and colored paints.

The festival organizers of this year's event will be donating all proceeds from ticket sales and sponsorships to a government relief fund for the victims and their family members.

The Holi is a "festival of colors" where participants throw colored dye and powder at each other. The local Indian community has been organizing Holi since 2012 on a non-profit basis to bring the community together with the idea that "We are one world," similar to the splashing of colors that blurs cultural and ethnic differences.

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especially at a time when Myanmar is under military control and has ongoing civil disobedience.

"We were asked by the local police to fill in the form for registration [at a stadium]," a Rohingya refugee in Jammu told Nikkei Asia on condition of anonymity about an incident he saw last month. "We were also told that, after COVID-19 tests, we will be released. [But] instead, people who were present [at] the stadium were taken to a detention center in the Hiranagar subjail in Kathua." According to him, there were five to seven pregnant women among the detainees.

As the government mulls the repatriation of the Rohingya Muslims from India, the fate of over 6,000 refugees in Jammu is in the balance. Local authorities in Jammu and Kashmir, in line with directions given by New Delhi, are busy working on identifying local Rohingya, who are seen as "illegal immigrants" and needed to be deported back to Myanmar.

Analysts say their naval presence in the Indo-Pacific at the same time highlights the risk of military conflict between the powers, as Beijing asserts its maritime claims in the region more aggressively and Washington focuses its defence strategy on countering China.

It comes amid a deepening dispute between Beijing and Manila over the presence of Chinese vessels – which the Philippines says are a maritime militia but China says are fishing boats – in the Whitsun Reef in the South China Sea.

The Philippine foreign ministry on Monday said China's claims that the boats were sheltering from bad weather were "blatant falsehoods" and "clearly [a] false narrative of China's expansive and illegitimate claims in the West Philippine Sea".

Echo and Bifrost trans-Pacific cables, as the company is calling them, will increase capacity for data transfer between the Americas and Southeast Asia by 70%. The Echo cable is also backed by investment from Google, which says that the cable will run from "Eureka, California to Singapore, with a stop-over in Guam, with plans to also land in Indonesia. Additional landings are possible in the future."

The move is the latest in a growing trend of tech companies like Microsoft and Facebook investing in connectivity infrastructure around the world—Google is an investor in six undersea cables that have already been completed. Until recently, projects like fiber optic cables were primarily undertaken by telecom firms. Around 98% of the world's internet and telephone communications are now carried by undersea cables, with about 400 in existence as of March 2021, according to Bloomberg.

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
