Members of the National Applied Research Lab Visited the **Taiwan-Asia Exchange Foundation**

 ${f M}$ embers of the New Southbound Policy(NSP) project office from the National

Applied Research Laboratories (NARLabs) visited the Taiwan-Asia Exchange Foundation on July 10.

Operated by NARLabs, the NSP project office of the Ministry of Science and Technology (MoST) has the mission to enhance exchanges and cooperation in science and technology between Taiwan and NSP countries.

Since 2017, MoST has funded Taiwanese colleges to establish the "Science and Technology Innovation Center" (STIC) in NSP countries. So far, 12 STIC have been set up in Singapore, Indonesia, Malaysia, India, Vietnam, Thailand, Sri Lanka, the Philippines, and Myanmar. NARLabs itself also has an office open in Bangkok, Thailand in 2019.

TAEF, promoting NSP from a human-oriented perspective, looks forward to deepening cooperation with NARLabs.

The New Southbound Cultural Salon will be happening on July 23 at Thinkers' Studio in Taipei. Invited speakers include Morris Huang, the associate negotiator at the Office of Trade Negotiations (OTN), Executive Yuan, and Liang-chun Chen, the Editor-in-Chief of Taiwan Paranoma, Ministry of Foreign Affairs.

Morris will be providing commentary on the newest developments of the New Southbound Policy (NSP) and the integration of new immigrants through a governmental lens. The OTN is one of the NSP's primary drivers. Besides foreign trade and negotiations, the NSP also covers talent exchange, resource sharing, and regional linkage. In the past four years, exchange programs under the NSP have encompassed across fields such as agriculture, medicine, tourism, construction, education, and more. Liang-chun Chen will be sharing NSP stories accumulated over the years, from art performances to cultural preservation, and tech cooperation to epidemic prevention; reporters from Taiwan Paranoma have documented the relations and stories of Taiwan and New Southbound countries.



Breakthrough in Literary Exchange: The First Vietnamese Translation of the History of Taiwanese Literature

The Center for Vietnamese Studies announced the publication of "ĐẦU LƯÕI VÀ NGÒI BÚT: LỊCH SỬ VĂN HỌC TIẾNG MỆ ĐỂ ĐÀI LOAN" (History of Taiwanese Literature). The *History of Taiwanese Literature* was written by Taiwanese scholar LIAU Sui-beng and published by the National Museum of Taiwan Literature in 2013. It was later translated into Vietnamese and published by Vietnamese Writers' Association (Nhà Xuất Bản Hội Nhà Văn) in Hanoi. Dr. Wi-vun CHIUNG, the editor-in-chief of the

Vietnamese edition and the chairperson of Taiwanese Literature Department at National Cheng Kung University, said that the partnership with the Vietnamese Writers' Association in publishing the Vietnamese edition of the *History* was particularly encouraging under the condition that there are no formal diplomatic relations between Taiwan and Vietnam.

Calls for India to Play the Taiwan Card Grow Louder

Amid the continuing border standoff, there is increasing public antagonism toward China in India. This matches growing anger among Indian elites toward China and India's current China policy, which I wrote about last week. This is leading to more public discussion about possible asymmetric diplomatic strategies to challenge China, such as altering India's "one China policy" to enhance India's relations with Taiwan.

For example, a prominent Indian national newspaper, Indian Express, editorialized in May that India should be pragmatic in considering the question of Taiwan's observer status in the World Health Assembly: the decision "should not be made either out of peevishness or fear." The editorial argued that New Delhi should judge the issue on "apolitical appreciation of the specific technical issues involved." Thus, though the paper did not call for changing India's general policy on China and Taiwan, it was a reflection of the growing debate about the general unhappiness with India's ultracautious policy when it comes to China.

Other opinions have been much more insistent. The Times of India, editorializing on the same issue, asked the government to "not shy away from supporting Taiwan." The editorial went one step further than the Indian Express by saying that this should remain an important aspect of the reform of the World Health Organization (WHO). It also argued that India should stop being "overly deferential to Beijing" when China has routinely worked against Indian interests in the UN and other multilateral organizations. The Times of India concluded that "if Delhi is to get itself taken seriously, it must demonstrate that it can stand up and be counted."

It should be noted that this is not the first time that the Times of India has taken such a stand on Taiwan. In 2019, in the wake of Chinese threats to Taiwan, the paper put out an editorial arguing that India should step up its cooperation with Taiwan. It also made

reference to a 2018 Indian Parliamentary Standing Committee report on India-China relations, which called for a stronger partnership between India and Taiwan, adding that it was strange that India has shied away from cooperating with Taiwan, whereas Taipei and Beijing had active trade and investment ties despite their political disagreements.

Thailand's Cabinet on Wednesday approved a draft bill that will legally recognize same-sex civil partnerships and give greater rights to same-sex couples, a potential first for any nation in Southeast Asia if passed into law.

If ratified by parliament, it would make Thailand only the second place in Asia to allow for the registration of same-sex unions after Taiwan

video call, according to the Philippine Department of Foreign Affairs. "Both sides reaffirmed that contentious maritime issues are not the sum total of the Philippines-China bilateral relationship," it said on Wednesday.

Wang also dwelled on the statement by US Secretary of State Mike Pompeo, who on Monday rejected most of China's claims in the disputed waterway. Analysts say Washington's fullthroated stance signals more military activity in the South China Sea, and potential sanctions on Chinese entities to push back on Beijing's influence.
