Learning From Each Other: Scholarly Exchanges in Southeast Asian Studies

Separated by a little more than an hour's flight, Taiwan and the Philippines are in the same time zone and face similar social, economic, and labor issues. By harnessing the power of academic platforms, young scholars at National Chengchi University's Center for Southeast Asian Studies hope to find solutions for issues such as land reform, poverty, and preservation of cultures.

Last year, 15 students from countries including Taiwan, the Philippines, Cambodia, and Vietnam participated in the first Winter School for Advanced Philippine Studies workshop. The course was jointly organized by National Chengchi University's Center for Southeast Asian Studies (CSEAS), the Philippines' Southeast Asian Studies Regional Exchange Program (SEASREP), National Chi Nan University's Department of Southeast Asian Studies, and the Taiwan‡Asia Exchange Foundation (TAEF). Taiwan News **Taiwan, Vietnam Ink MOU on Husbandry Cooperation**



Wednesday, Sep 25, 2019

Taiwan and Vietnam signed a memorandum of understanding (MOU) to cooperate in the husbandry industry on Wednesday (Sept. 25), as part of the island nation's bid to promote exchanges with Southeast Asia.

The document was inked at the second forum on the "Genetic Selection on Climate-Resilient Farm Animals" held in Taipei, reported <u>United Daily News</u>. The event saw the participation of industry experts and officials from the U.K., Indonesia, Laos, Malaysia, the Philippines, Thailand, and Vietnam.

According to Livestock Research Institute of the Council of Agriculture, Taiwan partnered with the Philippines through similar initiatives in 2015 and 2016. Under the MOU, Taiwan and Vietnam will embark on projects such as husbandry material exchange, talent training, and other initiatives.

Taipei Times New Southbound Policy: EPA Eyes Export of 'Green' Knowhow

Washington has lauded Taiwan's achievements in environmental protection as a source of inspiration for nations in the Asia-Pacific region.

In just 25 years, Taiwan has built one of the world's most efficient recycling systems from scratch, with a recycling rate of 60 percent last year, one of the highest in the world, US Environmental Protection Agency Principal Deputy Assistant Administrator Jane Nishida said in October last year.

Taiwan's decades of knowledge of environmental policy, regulations, technology, services, maintenance and innovation could all serve as assets to benefit its partner nations. "It is environmental diplomacy," EPA Deputy Director Tsai Hung-teh (蔡鴻德) said. "Taiwan is well-equipped to play the role of a regional technical center, research center and training center. Many of our visitors are potential high-ranking government officials and these exchanges allow them to develop closer relations with Taiwan. We help with their environmental issues, while we gain friends and create more opportunities for our green industries."

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Taiwan News Taiwan takes in more than 36,000 Vietnamese overseas workers

Tuesday, Oct 01, 2019

In the first eight months of the year, there were 91,663 overseas Vietnamese workers, with 36,825 (40.17 percent) taking a job in Taiwan, according to a CNA report on Tuesday. The CNA report was based on Vietnam government statistics. Of the 91,663 Vietnamese migrant workers, 30,734 were female.

Taiwan is the second largest employer of Vietnamese overseas workers behind Japan, which hired 45,622 Vietnamese during the same eight-month period. Also, in August, Vietnam sent out 11,699 overseas workers, 6,080 of whom went to Japan, with 4,566 going to Taiwan, the report added.

India's banking sector has been going through a rough patch for the last five years. The number of non-performing assets (NPAs) has sky-rocketed. At its peak, the gross NPA to advances ratio exceeded 11 per cent. Until the NPA crisis hit, banks contributed more than 90 per cent of the economy's commercial credit. As a result, any impairment of banking has a deep and longlasting impact on the economy.

The recent NPA crisis has been accompanied by a sharp decline in investment growth and a significant economic slowdown. Among the many factors that the crisis has been attributed to, a critical one is the dominance of government-owned banks in the system. In India, governmentowned banks, or public sector banks (PSBs), account for 70 per cent of bank loans. During the recent banking crisis, they were hit worse than private and foreign banks and accounted

Asia's Deadly Annual Haze is Back

As children and teenagers from over 100 countries went on strike and protested about the world's inability to deal with climate change, the annual haze which suffocates much of Southeast Asia has made an unwanted return.

Southeasterly winds have pushed the noxious haze from Borneo and Sumatra in Indonesia as far as the Gulf of Thailand and into Vietnam and Cambodia. Authorities insist <u>they</u> are acting this year and have arrested over 200 people on suspicion of starting some of the fires to clear land for crops.

Catches Swine Fever, U.S. crop Exporters get the Chills

Last year, Southeast Asian farms offered a lifeline to U.S. grain exporters wounded in a bitter trade war with China. Now, African swine fever is set to tear through those markets, killing off business as surely as the fatal disease decimates vast herds of pigs once raised on U.S. crops.

U.S. feed crop exports to countries like Vietnam, Myanmar and the Philippines surged nearly 50% last year to a record 12.3 million tonnes. That helped to cushion the blow of a slump that wiped out nearly three-quarters of China sales of the same crops as Washington and Beijing exchanged tit-fortat trade tariffs.

But the scale of the shipments to Southeast Asia that could be lost due to the incurable pig disease highlights the headache for growers in the U.S. grainbelt: Unless a trade deal unlocks China, farmers will have for <u>90 per cent of the</u> total NPAs. The PSBs had to make provisions for these bad loans, resulting in the erosion of their capital. little option but to stockpile, not sell their crops.
