m AEF}$ has been honored to receive high-profile government officials in consecutive weeks.

On March 18, Minister Chen-Yuan Tung of the Overseas Community Affairs Council (OCAC) visited TAEF. Having served as Taiwan's ambassador to Thailand for three years, Minister Tung shared that Taiwanese business communities are influential, united, and well-connected with local communities, which constitutes the foundation of Taiwan-Thailand relations.

We exchanged ideas on how to better share resources and expand networks under the New South Policy. TAEF is looking forward to working alongside OCAC to foster friendship and to strengthen partnership with our counterparts in New Southbound countries.

In the following week, on March 23, we received Vice President Ching-te Lai. Being the keynote speaker at last year's Yushan Forum's Roundtable Dialogue, Vice President Lai pays considerable attention to Taiwan's New Southbound Policy.

During his visit, we had a fruitful exchange of ideas on the future developments of the New Southbound Policy, which has great potential to build partnerships between Taiwan and the region in areas such as culture, regional resilience, and people-to-people exchange.

Why India Needs to Look East At Taiwan?

"If there is one country India should be using as a role model for pandemic management, as well as putting its Make-in-India initiative on a stronger foundation, it is Taiwan."

The Taiwan-India relation has been a widely-discussed topic in the Indo-Pacific. A feature of this issue was published recently on Mint, an India-based online newspaper, in which politicians and several academics of different disciplines were interviewed, including TAEF's executive director Dr. Alan Yang and visiting fellow Dr. Sana Hashmi.

"The pandemic has given Taiwan an opportunity to demonstrate its capability to be a responsible member of the international community," said Dr. Alan Yang, explaining the difference between Taiwan and China. He also pointed out that Taiwan has extensive experience in assessing locations for supply chain development in Southeast Asia and has recently invested 2 billion USD in India, creating thousands of job opportunities.

Meanwhile, from the political point of view of India, Shiv Shankar Menon--the former ambassador to China--underlined that Taipei and New Delhi should consider signing a bilateral trade agreement since it will enhance the two countries' complementary nature in manufacturing: Taiwan as a world-leading provider of technology prowess in global supply chains, and India as a global manufacturing hub with its large workforce and mid-level managerial talents.

From Taiwan's political perspective, Chih-Cheng Lo, a DPP legislator, believed that India was the prime beneficiary of Taiwan's New Southbound policy since India is an important new destination for Taiwan to relocate its SMEs from China.

However, some difficulties are ahead of this potential India-Taiwan partnership in trade and investment: both legislator Lo and Rahul Jacob mentioned India's bureaucratic red tape. In addition, Taiwanese SMEs do not find their interests in line with Modi's policies, which proposes production-lined incentive (PLI) schemes, targeting large companies while raising duties on thousands of manufacturing inputs.

Dr. Hashmi, TAEF's visiting fellow, pointed out that there is a lack of a framework or a rule book governing India-Taiwan ties in areas other than science and technology.

Taiwan Eases Restrictions on Business Travelers from Vietnam, Singapore

 ${f T}$ aiwan moves Vietnam and Singapore to a list of low-risk countries, allowing business travelers 5-day quarantines.

During his weekly press conference on Wednesday afternoon, Minister of Health and Welfare and CECC head Chen Shih-chung announced that because Vietnam and Singapore have met Taiwan's criteria to be categorized as low-risk for two consecutive weeks, their status has been changed from medium to low-risk.

Since March 1, business travelers from low-risk countries or regions are only required to undergo five days of quarantine, while business travelers from medium-risk areas need to quarantine for seven days.

Chen said that over the past two weeks, the majority of confirmed coronavirus cases in Vietnam were imported from abroad, while the new local cases were close contacts of those who had been in quarantine. He pointed out that over the same period, Singapore has only reported two local cases.

Vietnam Climbs up in Global Happiness Ranking

Indonesia and Malaysia are seeking an urgent Asean meeting to discuss the crisis, which has prompted international condemnation against the military.

Thousands of anti-coup protesters on Thursday marched on the streets of Myanmar, as the Singapore foreign minister was set to meet his Indonesian counterpart on a trip that was expected to include discussions on Myanmar.

Indonesia and Malaysia are seeking an urgent meeting of Southeast Asia's Asean regional grouping, of which Myanmar is a member, to discuss the crisis.

March 21, 2021

The Philippines urged China on Sunday to recall more than 200 Chinese boats in the South China Sea, saying the presence of the vessels violated its maritime rights as it claims ownership of the area.

The Philippine military had conducted air and maritime patrols in the South China Sea to further validate the report, spokesman Marine Major General Edgard Arevalo said.

The vessels are fishing boats believed to be manned by Chinese military-trained personnel, according to Philippines security officials.

March 20, 2021

Vietnam has climbed up four spots to 79th out of 149 countries and territories included in the 2021 World Happiness Report.

Vietnam scored 5.411 points, up from the 5.353 it got last year, according to the latest report released by the Sustainable Development Solutions Network, a global initiative launched by the United Nations in 2012.

In Southeast Asia, Vietnam's position was better than Malaysia (81), Indonesia (82), Laos (100), Cambodia (114) and Myanmar (126). It ranked behind Singapore (32), Thailand (54th) and the Philippines (61).
